THIS CAUSE came on to be heard and was heard on the 24th day of August, 2021, before the Honorable Tony Stansberry, Judge, holding the Sessions Court for Knox County at Knoxville, Tennessee.

THE COURT: Warrant No. @1355549, charges Westley Keck with domestic assault, a Class A Misdemeanor, violation of TCA Section 39-13-111, issued April the 1st of last year. Travis Brasfield represents Mr. Keck, and General Jones is the prosecutor. If you're going to testify in State v. Westley Keck, would you please come forward and raise your right hand?

(Whereupon, the witnesses were sworn in.)

THE COURT: Come on up and be seated. If you all will please be seated over there to my right. I've read the warrant into the record. You can proceed at your convenience, General.

1 GENERAL JONES: Thank you, Judge.

2 THE COURT: And here's the microphone.

3 KELLI SPEARS,

4 Having been first duly sworn, was called and

5 testified as follows:

6 DIRECT EXAMINATION

7 BY GENERAL JONES:

8 Q Can you tell us your first and last name?

9 A Kelli Spears.

10 Q Okay. I'm going to have you pull that
11 microphone to you and talk real loud into it. Do you know
12 Westley Keck?

13 A Yes.

14 Q How do you know Westley Keck?

15 A I dated him.

16 Q Can you tell me about how long you all
17 dated?

18 A Two months.

19 Q Did something happen to you on March the
20 27th of 2020 that brought you into court today?

21 A Yes.

22 Q Can you tell the judge what happened?

23 A I woke up to him screaming at me, and then
24 he hit me on the center of my back.

25 Q All right. What time was this?

1 A I'm really not sure. I know it was after
2 7:45.

3 Q How do you know that?

4 A Because that's when he got home from work.

5 Q Okay. Does he work night shift?

6 A Yes.

7 Q So he had come home from night shift, you
8 were sleeping, and how did you wake up?

9 A He was screaming at me and had pushed me on
10 my back.

11 Q Okay. Do you remember what he was
12 screaming?

13 A No.

14 Q Okay. Tell me what happened next.

15 A He was telling me to get out. And so as I
16 was trying to get out of bed, he kind of like grabbed my leg.
17 I was still trying to get out of the bed. So I ended up
18 falling on the floor.

19 Q Okay. Can you tell me where he grabbed
20 your leg?

21 A Like on the calf and the ankle.

22 Q Did you have any marks on your leg after
23 that?

24 A Yes.

25 Q Can you tell me just kind of what those

1 marks, if anything, looked like?

2 A They were kind of round, but they were like
3 in a pattern.

4 Q Like a hand print?

5 A Yeah.

6 Q Were they bruises?

7 A Yes.

8 Q Okay. So you said around the calf and the
9 ankle. And then what happened after that? You said you were
10 on the floor?

11 A Yeah.

12 Q Okay. What happened when you were on the
13 floor, if anything?

14 A Nothing, I don't believe. I don't
15 remember.

16 Q Okay. What happened next?

17 A He was telling me that I needed to get out.
18 And so I started to try and gather my things.

19 Q And after doing that, as you're gathering
20 your things, what did he do?

21 A He followed me around the townhouse.

22 Q Okay. How did that make you feel?

23 A It made me feel stuffy, like I couldn't
24 breathe.

25 Q Okay. You said it made you feel stuffy.

1 Were you scared?

2 A Yes.

3 Q Okay. Did he say anything to you as you're
4 gathering all of your things?

5 A Just telling me that I have to get out.

6 Q What happened next, as you're gathering
7 your things?

8 A He was following me around the apartment,
9 and I accidentally backed into him because he was standing
10 directly behind me when I was standing at the sink. I had
11 some jewelry laid out on the bathroom sink. I was just
12 trying to be fast and get out.

13 Q And then did something happen at the
14 washing machine? Can you tell me about that?

15 A Yes. I was sifting through the clothes in
16 the washing machine because I had washed some of mine and his
17 clothes, and hadn't put them in the dryer yet.

18 Q Okay. And what happened then?

19 A I don't remember.

20 Q Okay. Tell me why you don't remember it.
21 What's the last thing that you remember?

22 A I remember trying moving my head up as I
23 was pulling out a pair of leggings.

24 Q And then what's the next thing that you
25 remember?

1 A Being on his couch.

2 Q Okay. When you're on the couch are you --
3 how are you laying on the couch?

4 A On my back.

5 Q Okay. And then where was Mr. Keck when
6 that happened?

7 A Standing over me.

8 Q Okay. And how did that make you feel when
9 you see him standing over you on the couch?

10 A Like I needed to leave.

11 Q Okay. Were you scared?

12 A Yes.

13 Q Did you get up and leave immediately? What
14 happened after that?

15 A I started packing things. I had like two
16 bags of clothes and some like groceries in a shopping bag.

17 Q Okay. And were you able to leave the house
18 at that point?

19 A Yeah, he was standing in front of the door.

20 Q Okay. He was standing in front of the
21 door. Did he say anything to you when he was standing in
22 front of the door?

23 A He asked me where I was going.

24 Q Okay. He asked where you were going?

25 A (No verbal response.)

1 Q But he had been telling you to get out?

2 A Yes.

3 Q Was he blocking the door?

4 A He was mainly talking but I told him I was
5 leaving or I would scream.

6 Q Okay. You told him you were leaving or you
7 would scream?

8 A Yes.

9 Q Okay. And then what did he do in response
10 to that?

11 A He moved out of the way, even with the
12 steps.

13 Q And how did he make you feel when all of
14 that was happening?

15 A Like I really needed to leave.

16 Q All right. So do you leave the -- is it an
17 apartment or --

18 A It was a townhouse, I guess, or I think
19 it's classified as. I'm not sure.

20 Q Okay. So you leave the townhouse. Do you
21 immediately call the police?

22 A No.

23 Q Okay. What, if anything, do you do then?

24 A I started putting my bags into my car, and
25 I go back for my last one, and he kind of tosses it. And I

1 grab it and leave, and then go home.

2 Q Okay. And is home at (inaudible).

3 A No, it's my parents' house.

4 Q Okay. And then how do the police get
5 involved, I guess is the best way to ask this question?

6 A My mom worked for the detention center that
7 he also worked at.

8 Q Okay. Do you have a conversation with your
9 mom or what happened? Why did the police get notified?

10 A She actually texted me while she was on her
11 way home from court. I guess she was in the parking lot.
12 And she said, I would like to talk to you when I get home. I
13 hadn't been sleeping much anyway. So I just stayed awake
14 until she got home.

15 Q Okay. Did your mom see the bruises on your
16 leg?

17 A She saw the one that was on my eye, but she
18 had only seen --

19 MR. BRASFIELD: Speculation as to what her
20 mother saw.

21 THE COURT: Sustained.

22 BY GENERAL JONES:

23 Q Well, let's just talk specifically about
24 where, if any, you had bruises that were visible.

25 A I mean I was wearing long pants and a

1 t-shirt because I was at the house. This is when everything
2 was shut down. So the only thing you could see on me was my
3 face. So it was the only one on my face, my eye.

4 Q Okay. And do you know how you got that
5 bruise?

6 A No.

7 Q Did you have that bruise before March 27th?

8 A No.

9 Q Okay. Did you have any other bruises from
10 the March 27th incident?

11 A Yes.

12 Q Can you tell the judge what those were?

13 A I had two marks on my back, and I had some
14 pretty deep bruises from him grabbing me on my leg.

15 Q Now, this all happened at his townhouse on
16 (inaudible) Road, right?

17 A No.

18 Q Where did it happen at?

19 A I can't remember the address.

20 Q Was his townhouse in Knox County?

21 A Yeah, it was. It was in Powell.

22 Q Okay. (Inaudible) Mr. Keck. Do you see
23 him in the courtroom? And if you do, would you tell us what
24 color shirt he has on?

25 A White or gray.

1 GENERAL JONES: Let the record reflect she
2 has identified Mr. Keck.

3 THE COURT: Noted.

4 GENERAL JONES: Okay. That's all. Mr.
5 Brasfield may have a few questions. Okay?

6 THE WITNESS: Uh-huh.

7 CROSS EXAMINATION

8 BY MR. BRASFIELD:

9 Q Good morning, Ms. Spears. My name is
10 Travis Brasfield. I represent Mr. Keck. Earlier you said he
11 came in screaming and hit you; is that correct?

12 A I didn't specifically say he hit me, but he
13 did -- or at least I don't remember saying that, but he
14 pushed down on my back hard.

15 Q Okay. So he didn't hit you shortly after
16 7:45?

17 A I don't know exactly how you would classify
18 it but I know I was woken up by someone touching me
19 forcefully.

20 Q Okay. So if he didn't hit you at 7:45, you
21 later say he screamed and pushed you on your back; is that
22 correct?

23 A What? I didn't --

24 Q Did he push you on your back?

25 A What do you mean? I don't understand your

1 question.

2 Q Earlier you testified that you were
3 screaming and he pushed me on my back.

4 A Oh, yes. I thought you meant like from the
5 front to the back. I didn't understand your question.

6 Q So did he push you down onto your back or
7 you're saying he pushed you in the back?

8 A I said on my stomach. My back was facing
9 towards the roof.

10 Q So you were asleep. And when he got home
11 he didn't just start striking you immediately? Is that
12 incorrect or is that correct?

13 A I didn't know he was home until I heard
14 screaming.

15 Q You later said he grabbed you on your calf?

16 A Yes.

17 Q Now, the warrant says that he grabbed you
18 by the arm.

19 A He did grab my arm. But that wasn't on
20 March 27th.

21 Q So you're walking around, gathering your
22 stuff, and he's telling you to get out?

23 A Yes.

24 Q Okay. And then you went home and you
25 called 911?

1 A No.

2 Q When did you notify the police of this?

3 A I never did.

4 Q You never talked to any detective or
5 officer?

6 A I talked to them but I didn't call them.
7 His boss did.

8 Q Do you remember what you told them?

9 A Yes.

10 Q Did you tell them that he came home to get
11 you and that's how you woke up?

12 A He was screaming and pushing on my back.

13 Q Are you sure that's how this happened, as
14 you described it earlier?

15 A Yes.

16 Q Would you be surprised if there was a
17 recording of this event (inaudible).

18 A Yes.

19 MR. BRASFIELD: Thank you, ma'am.

20 GENERAL JONES: Nothing further from the
21 state.

22 THE COURT: You can step down, ma'am.

23 Thank you for your testimony. Does the state rest?

24 GENERAL JONES: That's the state's proof,
25 Judge.

1 (Whereupon, the witness was excused.)

2 THE COURT: Do you have any proof on behalf
3 of Mr. Keck, Mr. Brasfield?

4 MR. BRASFIELD: Yes, Your Honor. I call
5 Mr. Keck.

6 THE COURT: Okay. If you will come up and
7 be seated.

8 WESTLEY KECK,
9 having been first duly sworn, was called and
10 testified as follows:

11 DIRECT EXAMINATION

12 BY MR. BRASFIELD:

13 Q Mr. Keck, we're here today talking about
14 matters that happened on April the 27th?

15 A Yes, sir.

16 Q So you worked the night of the 26th, and
17 got off on the morning of the 27th, and go home; is that
18 correct?

19 A Yes, sir.

20 Q Tell me what happened when you got home.

21 A I got home after working night shift.
22 Kelli Spears was asleep on the couch. I went to take the
23 trash out and noticed empty vodka bottles in the trash can
24 that wasn't there the day before. I asked her -- I woke her
25 up and I asked her if she had been drinking. She said no. I

1 told her that I had found the liquor bottles that she was
2 hiding. After taking the trash out, I went back inside and
3 spoke to her, that she needed to leave. She refused. I
4 asked for her phone that was locked. I asked her to unlock
5 it to contact her mother. She did not. She went back to
6 sleep. After that, I convinced her -- I tried to convince
7 her for thirty minutes, I believe, to leave, that she needed
8 to go, and she refused. I told her that she could stay until
9 about 8:00 p.m. that night, because I had to leave for work
10 that night, to sober up. She was too intoxicated to leave.
11 I told her that, you know, she was more than welcome to stay.
12 She just stayed on the couch for the time being. I told her
13 that I was going to bed, that I didn't want to get anybody
14 else involved, I needed to get some rest. So I went
15 upstairs. She followed me upstairs. I began to record in my
16 bedroom. I laid down in my bed. She got in the bed with me.
17 I told her that she needed to leave, she needed to leave my
18 room. She was up there causing me problems. I told her
19 probably for a solid hour and a half, if not longer, that she
20 needed to leave, I didn't want her there. After that, after
21 the conversation I was still audio recording. I told her
22 that if she wasn't leaving, I was leaving, and she didn't
23 want that. So I got out of my bed, went downstairs. I was
24 going to leave. She got the rest of her things. She took
25 her purse and threw it, slinging her stuff everywhere

1 downstairs. I told her that she was an adult, that she
2 didn't need to act like that, that she needed to get it, pick
3 her stuff up and leave my house. She didn't.

4 Q When did she leave? How much time elapsed
5 from when you got home to when she left?

6 A I got home around seven-ish. This lasted
7 up until 11:45 or noon.

8 Q Did you scream at her?

9 A No, sir.

10 Q Did you hit her?

11 A No, sir.

12 Q Did you grab her leg, or grab her out of
13 the bed?

14 A No, sir.

15 Q Did you push her in the back?

16 A No, sir.

17 Q When she says she had bruises, marks and
18 scars, where did those come from?

19 A Some of those bruises happened before the
20 27th. I noticed that cut above her eye on the 25th. I asked
21 her even after I had seen it. She hid it with her hair. And
22 she said -- I said, it's cut. She said that she did it on a
23 pair of eyelash curlers. The one on her back happened way
24 before. It was probably the 19th, when I was getting ready
25 for work one night, I heard a crash coming up from

1 downstairs. I was in the bathroom at the time. And when I
2 leave the bathroom, at the base of the steps, she was laying
3 there. A couple of days later, I noticed on her back. I
4 even told her, I said, do you have a mark on your back from
5 you falling down the steps, because you were drinking.

6 Q Why didn't you want to get anyone else
7 involved? You said that earlier.

8 A I was just trying to convince her to leave
9 without any kind of conflict.

10 Q Did you ever have a chance to talk to
11 sheriff, deputy, or police officer about this?

12 A Not prior to my arrest, no.

13 Q Okay. Subsequent to your arrest, did you
14 talk to a police officer?

15 A Yes, sir.

16 Q What did you tell them?

17 A Exactly what I've told you.

18 Q Did you show them any pictures or give them
19 any recordings or anything like that?

20 A They actually confiscated my phone and
21 reviewed the audio recording that took place.

22 Q And what would that audio recording
23 describe? Describe what would be on it.

24 GENERAL JONES: Object, Your Honor. That
25 could be hearsay. If he wants to introduce it, he

1 can. But I don't think he can talk about what is
2 on the audio recording.

3 MR. BRASFIELD: That's fair, Your Honor.
4 I'd like to attach it as an exhibit.

5 THE COURT: I'm sorry. You'll have to
6 speak up. I can't hear you.

7 MR. BRASFIELD: Your Honor, I'm sorry. I'd
8 like to introduce it. Mr. Keck has it and can play
9 it.

10 THE COURT: Very good.

11 THE WITNESS: The audio covers --

12 BY MR. BRASFIELD:

13 Q Let's move on from the audio. Do you have
14 the audio with you?

15 A Yes, sir.

16 Q Now, I know you gave it to the deputy. So
17 have you reviewed it?

18 GENERAL JONES: (Inaudible).

19 MR. BRASFIELD: I'm sorry. Can I ask for a
20 brief recess so I can let the General hear this?

21 GENERAL JONES: (Inaudible).

22 THE COURT: We're in the middle of a
23 hearing. We need to proceed.

24 MR. BRASFIELD: I understand, Your Honor.
25 Do you want to review this?

1 GENERAL JONES: If you're going to
2 introduce it, I do.

3 MR. BRASFIELD: Yes, absolutely. I'm
4 sorry. I thought we could (inaudible) to the
5 General.

6 GENERAL JONES: Can we actually play the
7 audio because --

8 THE COURT: You cannot hear it?

9 GENERAL JONES: Yeah, I can hear it. It's
10 just an audio recording (inaudible). If he wants
11 to introduce it, that's fine.

12 MR. BRASFIELD: Yes, Your Honor, I would
13 like to introduce it as an exhibit, if I may. Do I
14 need to lay a foundation for the recording, Judge?

15 THE COURT: No. If she's not objecting ot
16 it, go ahead.

17 MR. BRASFIELD: Okay.

18 (Exhibit No. 1 was filed.)

19 (Whereupon, the recording was played.)

20 THE COURT: It's barely audible. I can't
21 hear anything she's saying. I can hear half of
22 what he's saying.

23 (Whereupon, the recording continued to be played.)

24 THE COURT: I mean the value of this is
25 limited, if any. I can't hear anything she's

1 saying. I can barely hear what he's saying. So if
2 you want to play it, that's fine. If you don't,
3 that's fine too. It's not picking up. I can't
4 hear it. It's not loud. I'm sorry.

5 MR. BRASFIELD: It's not loud. Really the
6 only purpose of the exhibit is that (inaudible)
7 there wasn't a physical assault. That there was
8 (inaudible). It was an amicable, reasonable --

9 GENERAL JONES: (Inaudible).

10 THE COURT: Do you have any other questions
11 for your client?

12 MR. BRASFIELD: I'll pass the witness, Your
13 Honor.

14 THE COURT: Cross examination.

15 CROSS EXAMINATION

16 BY GENERAL JONES:

17 Q Mr. Keck, how long have you been seeing Ms.
18 Spears?

19 A A few months.

20 Q Was this the first time you guys had gotten
21 into an altercation?

22 A There was no altercation.

23 Q Okay. Was this the first time you guys had
24 gotten into a fight?

25 A No.

1 Q Okay. Is this the first time you had asked
2 her to leave your apartment?

3 A No.

4 Q Okay. How often would you say that you had
5 asked her to leave your apartment?

6 A Two separation occasions, that being one of
7 them.

8 Q Okay. Was this the first time that she had
9 bruises after you asked her to leave your apartment?

10 A Repeat the question.

11 Q Was this the first time she ended up with
12 bruises after you asked her to leave your apartment?

13 A She's never left my apartment.

14 Q She didn't leave your apartment that day?

15 A Ever.

16 Q She's still at your apartment right now?

17 A Ma'am, during our relationship she's never
18 left.

19 Q Okay. That day when she left your
20 apartment did she have bruises?

21 A Yes.

22 Q Okay. Did you cause those bruises?

23 A No.

24 Q Would it surprise you that she has also
25 accused you of biting her before this incident?

1 A No, it wouldn't surprise me.

2 Q Okay. Have you ever bitten her before?

3 A No.

4 Q Have she ever asked you not to bite her?

5 A No.

6 Q Have you ever tripped her going up or down
7 the stairs?

8 A No.

9 Q Would it surprise you that she made that
10 allegation?

11 A No.

12 Q You said, the only thing that I could
13 really hear in the video, I don't want to cause you problems.
14 That's what you said to her. What did you mean by that?
15 What kind of problems would you cause her?

16 A Getting the police involved.

17 Q I don't want you to cause me any problems.
18 What do you mean by that?

19 A Getting the police involved.

20 Q Why would that cause you problems?

21 A Because I worked at the sheriff's office,
22 ma'am.

23 Q Why would that cause you problems if you
24 were just asking her to leave, and she was intoxicated?

25 A She stated that she would not leave unless

1 I called the police.

2 Q She did leave, and you didn't call the
3 police?

4 A Yes, ma'am.

5 GENERAL JONES: I think that's all the
6 questions I have.

7 THE COURT: Redirect, if any.

8 MR. BRASFIELD: Just a few.

9 REDIRECT EXAMINATION

10 BY MR. BRASFIELD:

11 Q Mr. Keck, I got a little confused when you
12 said she never left your apartment. What did you mean, she
13 never left your apartment? Can you explain that a little
14 further?

15 A Yes, sir. The duration of our
16 relationship, I can think of maybe one occasion that she left
17 my residence maybe. But prior to that, she's never left.
18 She stayed for months at my residence.

19 Q Did she walk outside the door?

20 A No, sir. Maybe when I was gone to work.

21 Q But other than that, she didn't leave?

22 A No, sir.

23 Q So what you were trying to say is, she was
24 there in your home the majority of the time?

25 GENERAL JONES: Your Honor, I'm going to

1 object. He needs to be the one that says what he
2 was saying.

3 THE COURT: Sustained.

4 BY MR. BRASFIELD:

5 Q Why didn't she leave your apartment?

6 A She wanted to stay.

7 Q What would she do all day when she was
8 there?

9 A Watched TV, drink, play games on her phone.
10 I was gone most of the time, usually work. But that's what
11 she did when I was there, and sleep.

12 Q Did you guys drink a lot?

13 A Somewhat. Not a lot.

14 Q Was there any other reason that you were
15 afraid to get a third party involved? Other than your
16 employment, was there someone that you were worried about
17 discovering the drinking?

18 A No, sir.

19 MR. BRASFIELD: Okay. Thank you.

20 THE COURT: Anything else from the state?

21 GENERAL JONES: No, Judge, nothing further
22 from us.

23 THE COURT: You're excused, sir. Thank you
24 for your testimony.

25 THE WITNESS: Thank you, Your Honor.

1 (Whereupon, the witness was excused.)

2 THE COURT: Does the defense rest?

3 MR. BRASFIELD: Yes, Your Honor.

4 THE COURT: Arguments, motions?

5 GENERAL JONES: Waive and reserve, Judge.

6 THE COURT: Argument.

7 MR. BRASFIELD: Your Honor, obviously, you
8 have conflicting testimony saying that he hit and
9 struck this lady, and he's saying he didn't. She
10 said there was a screaming match and a violent
11 assault that went on for over a half an hour. Your
12 Honor heard the audio recording, while it was not
13 motion picture quality, it is apparent that there
14 was no screaming and there was no fantastic violent
15 encounter that was captured. More importantly,
16 (inaudible) this matter was not reported until five
17 days later. Obviously there was a dispute between
18 these folks, and Mr. Keck, he was (inaudible) he
19 evicted her. And five days later these allegations
20 come forward.

21 I would submit to you that her testimony
22 has been rebutted, not only by his testimony, but
23 also by the exhibit, Your Honor. And I would ask
24 that you dismiss this charge.

25 THE COURT: General.

1 GENERAL JONES: Your Honor, what the victim
2 testified to today was that she was woken up by the
3 defendant yelling at her to get out of the
4 apartment, that he put marks on her back during
5 that part of the altercation, that he grabbed her
6 ankle and her calf and she had bruises there.
7 There was also testimony from her where she is
8 standing at the washing machine one moment, and
9 then the next thing she remembered was laying on
10 her back and looking up and seeing Mr. Keck. She
11 had a bruise on her eye (inaudible). We do have
12 (inaudible) but what I think makes more sense is
13 that she was scared of him, and she tried to leave.
14 And of course she doesn't want to get the police
15 involved because he was a police officer and she
16 knows how bad it looks for him to be charged with
17 domestic violence. He had a lot to lose here. So
18 the state is going to ask that you fined her as
19 (inaudible). She was scared of him. She had marks
20 on her. And it is a jury question.

21 THE COURT: I mean I don't know when the
22 tape was played. I don't have a time context. I
23 don't have, you know, where in the course of events
24 that she testified to, that he testified to, that
25 that was played, and it's a very poor quality. I'm

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going to bind the case over after finding probable
cause on the same bond. The bond conditions are
still in full force and effect, Mr. Keck.

(Whereupon, the proceedings were concluded.)

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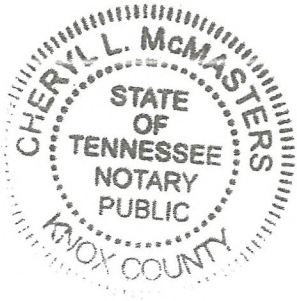
