# Motor Vehicle Decal Pilot Project

Tennessee's Department of Revenue is testing a new procedure for issuing motor vehicle registrations. Sumner County has been doing the test since December.

The pilot program involves a special printer that puts the decal right on the printed registration form for the customer to peel off and put on their plate (see below).



T.C.A. 55-4-208. Every Certificate of Registration shall at all times be carried in the vehicle to which it refers or shall be carried by the person driving or in control of such vehicle. Renewal of registration for all vehicles (except permanent registrations) are for twelve (12) months from the current expiration date. If the current expiration date falls on Saturday, Sunday, or a holiday, the current registration remains valid until the next business day.

Application Instructions  
1. Clean the delimiting area in the upper right corner of plate. 2. Remove decal by holding at edge of decal and separate from registration. 3. Rub firmly to apply decal to upper right corner of plate. 4. Keep registration with vehicle.

The printed decal also looks different. It displays the license plate number instead of a different 7-digit decal number and indicates if the wheel tax has been paid (see image below).



What it means for taxpayers: reduces the chances their decal will be stolen and it eliminates any confusion over which decal goes on what plate.

What it means for motor vehicle clerks:

- no more stapling decal to registration form
- no separate handling and accountability of packs of decals
- no more triple-printing of registration forms

The Department of Revenue will review the success of the pilot project and consider expanding it in counties across the state. No timetable has been set for those changes.
