One out of seven (15%) students were in a physical fight during the past 12 months.





This is a **12%** decrease compared to results from 2019.



One out of five (22%) students have seen someone physically attacked, beaten, stabbed, or shot in their neighborhood.

Nearly 17% of students were bullied on school property during the past 12 months,








More female students (21%) reported being bullied electronically than male students (10%).


Almost 40% of students felt so sad or hopeless that they stopped doing normal activities for two or more weeks in a row.



Female students (49.6%) were more likely to report this behavior than male students (28%).



Fewer than 4% of students smoked cigarettes during the past 30 days.



Cigarette use among KCS students has seen a significant **decline** since 2005.



More than one out of six students (18%) used an electronic vapor product in the past 30 days.

This percentage has **decreased** since 2019, when it was nearly 29%.




Almost 50% of students reported they were trying to lose weight.






More female students (59%) reported this than male students (37%).



This is an **improvement** from 2019 when nearly 31% reported they engaged in this behavior.





One out of four students (27%) were offered, sold, or given illegal drugs on school property during the past 12 months.
